Overview

Founded in 1927, SPC is Florida's first two-year college and the first to offer bachelor's degrees. SPC offers more than 187 degree and certificate programs, including many high-demand, high-skill industry - recognized workforce certifications. The college's career-focused curriculum is created with input from industry experts to give students the skills they need to meet the needs of today's employers. SPC's Guided Pathways Program gives students a clear roadmap to success to ensure they are taking the right courses, in the right sequence, with wrap-around supports to help them achieve their goals. The college's mission is to "empower our students and community to achieve success and economic mobility through academic excellence and engagement."

Degrees and Programs

St. Petersburg College offers the following academic programs:

- About two dozen **bachelor's degrees** that meet local workforce demands in high-needs areas.
- An **Associate in Arts** degree that emphasizes a liberal arts education and prepares students for a bachelor's degree at SPC or to transfer to a four-year college or university.
- Career and technical education programs (**Associate in Science and Certificates**) that lead to well-paying jobs in Pinellas County or furthering one's career.

SPC is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges which means credits transfer to reputable institutions.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE - CLOSING ACHIEVEMENT GAPS

SPC is committed to student success, and the focus of African American male students, their academic success, and persistence semester over semester. This is evidenced by the creation of the Brother-to-Brother program, a manager to lead this particular initiative, support for professional development, and the addition of an Equity and Diversity Director. The 2020 data on African American male success rates fall over fall and spring over spring notes the gains and the decrease in the size of the achievement gaps. The African American male success rate was 61.2% in spring 2019, followed by 64.6% in fall 2019 and 65.9% in spring 2020, followed by 67.2% in fall 2020. The most recent increase in success rates during

COVID indicates that our faculty and staff worked diligently to support students enrolled in mainly online courses. **Over four terms, the achievement gap improved by 6 percent.** Clear progress is being made in closing the achievement gap.

Primary efforts to accomplish this include:

- **Professional Development for Faculty, Administrators, and Staff**
The college implemented a comprehensive three-pronged approach to establishing SPC's culturally competent environment with professional development for our faculty, professional development for our student support staff, and professional and personal academic development for our students. It calls for critical reflection on the barriers to teaching and learning and builds a bridge of cultural competence that allows the instructor and student to partner in the student's academic success. To support the inclusion of culturally relevant pedagogy and support, the College provided a two-part professional development experience for faculty and staff entitled "Transformative Pedagogy for Student Success" with Dr. Chike Akua. Dr. Akua is a leading authority on increasing the achievement of today's students. His cultural proficiency, equity, and accountability work is known nationally for assisting school systems in improving school and community climate and culture.
- **African American Male Onboarding Strategy, and the Implementation of Summer Bridge Initiatives**
A series of onboarding events were designed to assist African American males in acclimating to St. Petersburg College. These events include but were not limited to developing a Summer Bridge Program, implementing a Brother-to-Brother wrap-around program, creating an onboarding program for First Time in College African American males, and academic and social activities.
- **Increase Use of Student Support Services**
The African American Male Student Success Taskforce, the **Learning Resources Outreach Initiative** and Momentum Outreach program worked in tandem to form a cycle of support and wrap around services. In this cycle provides frequent faculty engagement. It monitored and supported nearly 2,200 African American males through informal employee mentoring and engagement increase student success and close the achievement gaps.

ECONOMIC MOBILITY – SHORT TERM TRAINING

Expansion of high-wage, short-term certificate programs (non-credit and credit): SPC has strived to support the attainment of industry credentials & certifications to upskill and reskill our community's workforce in order to fill mid-to high wage jobs throughout Tampa Bay. The College is committed to ensuring innovative programs leading to economic mobility are offered through securing strategic partnerships designed to secure local, state, and private funding sources. To date, we have assisted students in earning over 883 industry certifications this year, exceeding the goal of 870.

- Thanks to the **FLDOE Rapid Credentialing Grant**, the College was able to start several new non-credit, industry certification-based programs across an array of industries. New programs include Electrical Lineworker, Certified Production Technician, Amazon Web Services, UAS Drone Safety, Entrepreneurship Essentials, Patient Care Technician, Solar Power Associate, and Phlebotomy Technician. The Grant also allowed SPC to offer scholarships to qualified Pinellas County residents alleviating tuition costs for many students. The grant provided \$797K to 1,027 students, earning 871 credentials.
- The **Governor's Emergency Education Relief (GEER) Fund**, Rapid Credentialing Grant Program under the CARES Act, provided SPC funding to enroll and complete students in short-term, in-demand workforce credentialing and certificate programs. With this funding, SPC offered over \$500,000 in scholarships and fee waivers, helped launch new programs including Lineworker and Solar Technician, as well as enhanced and expanded existing programs with new equipment and technology.
- SPC is running a community program, **St. Pete Works**, at the college's Midtown Center. The program, a collaboration of community-based organizations, works with employers and local agencies to help people acquire skills in one of the city's five "Grow Smarter" target industries: marine and life sciences, specialized manufacturing, creative arts and design, financial services, and data analytics.
- Other program growth highlights include:
 - **Power Florida lineman program center opens at Allstate:** The Power Florida Training Center, which will serve as the home for SPC's new electrical lineworker program, opened in February. The college collaborated with Duke Energy, PowerTown Line Construction, the Pinellas County Urban League and

other community partners to launch this program and help close this workforce gap. In an effort to find local and diverse talent, Duke Energy generously donated \$100,000 to develop the training facility, hire an instructor and purchase classroom equipment. The program also was funded by the Florida Department of Education's Rapid Credentialing Grant, which came out of the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act.

- **Google IT Training:** In partnership with Jobs for the Future (JFF), SPC Workforce Education was awarded a \$100,000 grant to serve students affected by COVID-19. In Fall 2020, 150 students were enrolled in asynchronous, no-cost Google IT training. Moving forward, SPC will continue to run the Google IT program under revised live-online format that will allow for the generation of tuition revenue. SPC was recognized by JFF as an "exemplary college" in the execution of this program.
- **Community Health Worker Apprenticeship:** SPC has developed a Community Health Worker Apprenticeship in partnership with Community Health Centers of Pinellas. This program is the first of its kind to embed articulation credit opportunities into their training while also generating enrollments for SPC with an included human services course. Apprenticeship programs incorporate on-the-job training to build an educated workforce and ensure strong community partnerships.
- **Community Foundation of Tampa Bay -Mental Health First Aid Training (\$300,000):** SPC in collaboration with Community Foundation of Tampa Bay, Love IV Lawrence and other partners such as the Humana Foundation and Humana's local Bold Goal initiative provides at no cost Mental Health First Aid training. Corporate College administers the program, scheduling and publicizing classes and other administrative responsibilities. The project strategies are to certify at least 5,000 people who work in nonprofit organizations, faith communities, educational institutions and other areas that deal with the public, trained at least 16 new MHFA instructors in our service region (who would each commit to provide MHFA training to at least 100 people over three years), train 16 existing MHFA instructors to administer the training in a virtual setting. Community Foundation of Tampa Bay has committed \$300,000 over three years to support the program. Humana Foundation provided \$25,000 for instructor training expenses.
- **St. Petersburg Area Chamber of Commerce Grow Smarter Scholarship (\$25,000):** SPC in collaboration with St. Petersburg Area Chamber of Commerce- Grow Smarter and St. Petersburg College's Foundation provided \$25,000 in scholarships to St. Petersburg residents working in the service, retail, and hospitality areas whose jobs have been impacted or lost due to COVID-19. The scholarship covered full tuition, books and materials. Residents earned credentials that will made them eligible for jobs in the areas of: Creative Arts & Design, Data Analytics, Financial Services, Marine & Life Science and Specialized Manufacturing.
- **CMA/PCT Healthcare Training Expansion:** Thanks to a generous gift from the Hough Foundation, SPC Workforce Education was able to hire for the first time ever two fulltime Certified Clinical Medical Assistant and Patient Care Technician instructors. These fulltime hires will allow the department to greatly increase the number of students served from the additional Allied Health class offerings. Workforce Education was also able to purchase much-needed medical equipment through the gift.
- **Entrepreneurship Training for CTE Students:** SPC received a grant to promote and cultivate entrepreneurial mindsets and capabilities for Career and Technical Education (CTE) students. This funding allows SPC to provide professional development training for CTE teachers and faculty on how to infuse an entrepreneurial mindset into their curriculum. In addition, SPC is working with community partners (Pinellas County Schools, CareerSource, and USF's Stavros Center) to promote entrepreneurial capabilities among students through hands-on activities such as workshops or competitions. The project fosters the development of an entrepreneurship alliance among community partners to promote entrepreneurial mindsets and capabilities in students and help them cultivate skills that are in-demand for employers and learn more about entrepreneurial academic and workforce pathways.
- **Defense STEM Education Consortium (DSEC):** The Department of Defense has awarded SPC a grant to support the development and promotion of STEM educational and career pathways for minority and underrepresented populations at community colleges. This initiative builds off the College's current efforts to provide students with work-based learning opportunities through internships. Leveraging existing efforts, this initiative will support 45 underrepresented and veteran students in STEM pathways through paid summer internships and career readiness workshops.

CIVIC and COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- **Collaborative Labs**, now in its 17th year, have been uniquely positioned to “stand in the gap,” during this critical pandemic-time, as the “go-to-experts” to facilitate strategic collaboration. They have facilitated close to **100 virtual/hybrid engagements**, including: National and Statewide Conferences, Community & Industry Convenings, SPC Townhalls, and our “bread and butter clients” representing Private Sector, Non-Profit and Governmental sectors. Collaborative Labs initiatives included: Jobs for the Future; Grow Smarter; LEAP; CareerSource Pinellas; St. Pete Works; Achieva; Bay Area Legal Services; Superior Group of Companies; Great Bay Distributors; Frank Crum; TOP Jewish Foundation; Florida Holocaust Museum; Palm Beach County Mobility Summit; Kresge Transportation Data Walk; Pinellas County Workforce; and St. Pete Wrap-Around Services Collaborative.
- SPC continues to support the most important priorities in our Region, in **Equity and Health Community Engagements** through our Collaborative Labs. **DEI Engagements (Diversity, Equity & Inclusion)** include: SPC’s collegewide Live Equity Event; Tampa Bay Equity Conference; Tampa Bay Chamber Economics of Equity Convening; St. Pete Cohort of Champions; City of St. Pete Structural Racism Study; City of Clearwater Equity Roundtable; Florida Blue Foundation Statewide Equity Conference; St. Pete DEI Asset Mapping; City of Largo Commission Equity Retreat; Super Bowl LV Equity Roadmap; Tampa Bay Partnership & St. Pete Arts Alliance Equity Strategy. **Community Health Engagements** include: Juvenile Welfare Board Strategic Planning and Community Summit; Johns Hopkins ACH Wrap-Around Services Collaborative; James A Haley VA Summit; Salon Talk Human Trafficking Summit; Hillsborough County Social Services Strategic Planning; St. Petersburg “Enough is Enough” Convening; Charlotte County Veterans Services Collaborative; Clearwater Housing Authority Strategic Retreat; Clearwater Free Clinic; Healthy Start Coalition of Pinellas Healthy Babies Summit.
- **Civic Engaged Learning (CEL) imbedded in curriculum:** A little over 90 courses added the civic engagement component as a requirement within the course for this past year; with a plan in place to increase the number of CEL courses for the upcoming year. Besides CEL, community engagement at SPC consisted of being the convener (physically and virtually) for civic engagement and improvement; hosting several meetings with various stakeholders from local and county government, to statewide elected officials, and business leaders. Lastly, the number of participants from faculty, staff, and students, exceeded two thousand plus individuals who gave over 16,000 hours of their time in dedication to civic engagement activities. Because the college solicited opportunities to partner with various groups and organizations, the SPC brand expanded and will continue to do so not only in Pinellas, the state of Florida and United States, but also globally. SPC students and staff volunteered 16,930 hours, the equivalent of \$470,910 in hours contributed to the community.
- **Deuces Den**, opened at SPC’s Midtown Center, offering not only delicious food but also serving to facilitate collaborative work among small minority businesses and offering aspiring restaurateurs a place to sell their cuisine to the public at no cost to the vendors.
- The **Applied Ethics Institute** serves as a community resource through seminars, lectures, ethics training and continuing education programs. This year, the institute hosted several informative lectures including: a discussion with Professor Todd May who served as a consultant on the TV hit *The Good Place*, ethics and genetics with Dr. Jacob McCauley, and a panel discussion on the relationship between pets and people.
- **The Institute for Strategic Policy Solutions (ISPS)** offers a forum for the community to both learn and be heard. In 2020-21, ISPS hosted several candidate forums preceding local elections, a veterans’ resource fair, and many more on topics including health, guardianship, cybersecurity, candidate forums, community resources, and much more.
- The seven **Titan Food Pantry** locations operate food pantries to relieve food insecurity and provide assistance to students in need.
- In collaboration with Hope Villages of America, the Center for Civic Learning and Community Engagement, SPC students and employees honored the **MLK Day of Service** by provided food boxes to more than 2,500 families in the community. Delivery began in November with the final food bank events at the Clearwater and St. Petersburg/Gibbs campuses in January.

CONTINUED COVID-19 RESPONSE

As part of CARES Act, SPC received \$95.9M from the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF). These funds were used to provide emergency financial aid grants to students, pay off student past due balances, update technology and services needed for effective remote learning, and provide safe on-campus environments during the ongoing COVID-19

pandemic. Understanding the need for these funds to be distributed to students, SPC was one of the first institutions nationally to award CARES funds to students.

- SPC received \$6,406,741 of CARES 1 funds and distributed \$6,219,005. The College was able to award 10,419 students with \$500 and 1,183 students received awards of up to an additional \$1,000.
- SPC received CARES 2 funds of another \$6,406,741. For the first \$6,000,000, the College awarded \$1,000 to students enrolled in 9 or more credit hours and \$500 to students enrolled in 1 to 8 credit hours.
- Total of \$8.6M CARES Act Funds distributed to 12,000 students.
- \$12,896 additional emergency funds distributed to students.
- **Shift to Virtual** -As the pandemic progressed, The College quickly adapted to meet students where they were and pivoted to a virtual environment. In the summer of 2020, we created a *Virtual Advising* platform to assist students who needed quick advising. Virtual Advising has increased advisor/student interactions by 87%.
- SPC employees founded the **HOT CARES Team** to provide support and encouragement to their colleagues. Team members reached out to all employees to touch base, offer resources, and check on their general well-being.

US NEWS & WORLD REPORT RANKINGS

- SPC was listed among the **top-ranked schools in U.S. News & World Report's 2021 Best Online Programs** list.
- SPC achieved rankings in three categories – **Best Online Bachelor's Program Overall, Best Online Bachelor's Program in Business and Best Online Program for Veterans**. Not only did SPC rank nationally for Best Online Bachelor's Programs in Business for the first time, but it tied for #1 within the Florida College System (FCS). The college placed #3 for Best Online Bachelor's Program Overall and Best Online Bachelor's Program for Veterans, compared to other FCS institutions

LIVE ONLINE MODALITY

In response to student desire for a more traditional online format, SPC created a LIVE ONLINE course format that meets in the online environment synchronously. As the format became increasingly popular, a group of instructors created a training to support their colleagues interested in becoming experts in this format.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, and INCLUSION

- SPC's new Office of Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) seeks to enhance the culture of respect, inclusiveness and belonging in all aspects of the college. Its focus is on: meeting with student leaders, faculty and provosts to gauge where the college stands in the order of EDI; reviewing the college's Title IX policies and procedures to

ensure compliance; hosting a faculty Summer Institute on cultural competence; and developing its office/branding.

- As part of the CCSSE, the Race and Ethnicity pilot survey noted 88% of respondents agree there is a culture of caring at SPC and 84% reported they feel they belong.

STUDENT SERVICES

Nationally Certified Advisors, Career Services Coordinators and a host of student support services provide students with a helping hand each step along their Academic and Career Pathway.

- **TITANS UP** celebrated its first four graduates at the Seminole Campus while their families and administration cheered them on. The program continues to grow and is expanding to the Clearwater Campus.
- **ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES** leverages technology and learning opportunities to serve more students. Enrollment continues to increase with transcription services expediting communications between faculty, staff and students. Training continues for Note Taking Express, a software that supports alternative learning and access to academic materials.
- In 2020, SPC partnered with **Mantra Health**, a telemental health service, to ensure student access to mental health care throughout their academic journey.

ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY

SPC used EMSI to study the College's impact on its local community. SPC provides a \$1.2B annual impact on the Pinellas County economy. Its operational spending provides a \$163.8M net impact in income to the county. It supports 17,547 jobs annually. And for every \$1 spent, the community receives \$8.40 in return.

GOLDEN KEY HONOUR SOCIETY

- SPC's Chapter of Golden Key International Honor Society receive the *GKS Key Chapter Award*. Roughly five percent of Golden Key chapters around the world receive this top distinction, and it was SPC's third year in a row to earn the prize.

PHI THETA KAPPA

- Seminole Campus' Phi Theta Kappa chapter, Beta Theta Omega, was one of only two chapters in the state to reach the highest level (5) of engagement through their activities and milestones achieved.
- The chapter place 7th among best of the Florida Region.
- The group won an Honors in Action grant to co-publish a children's book about Water Quality with Pinellas County Utilities.

MODEL UNITED NATIONS

- SPC's Model United Nations team **was named Distinguished Delegation** at the virtual 2020 National Model UN Conference in Washington, D.C. and an Outstanding Position Paper award at the 2020 National Model UN Conference in New York. Though students did not travel to New York because of the COVID-19 pandemic, NMUN judged the position papers that students from around the nation had prepared for the conference.

FACILITIES NEWS

- **Joseph H. Lang Sr. Student Success Center** – A longtime college vision was realized in 2020 with the completion of the Joseph H. Lang Sr. Student Success Center on the Gibbs/St. Petersburg Campus. The state-of-the-art center replaces the 80-year-old administration center, SPC's oldest building. The 48,000 square foot center provides students with "one-stop" access to critical support services such as admissions and registration, advising, financial aid, testing, learning and career services, and other student support services.
- The College continued its work on reducing its physical footprint and **sold the District Office**. Offices from that building have been relocated to the Downtown Center (Financial, Foundation, Legal, and the President's Office), EPI Services (Accounting, Admissions, Human Resources, Marketing), EPI Tech (Institutional Effectiveness, Financial Aid, and Clearwater (Colleges of Business and Computer and Information Technology, Information Systems).

RESOURCE ALIGNMENT & SPC FOUNDATION

- The Foundation received \$90K in **Community Investment funding from United Way Suncoast** for the College’s programs, FAFSA: Fill It Out! And It’s MY FUTURE! These programs expand efforts to provide one-on-one assistance to families needing help with the FAFSA application process. They also help provide financial literacy information to current students with a goal of lowering borrowing levels for in-school students and delinquency levels for students who have moved into repayment.
- \$8.5M raised in scholarships and waivers.
- \$3.8M raised by the Foundation: \$2.6 for scholarships to 3,985 students, \$1.5M support to the college.
- \$88M in disbursements of federal and state grants, work-study or loans.
- \$140K raised for the Titan Fund

SPC ALUMNI

- The SPC Alumni Association unites the alumni and the college, provides assistance and career development opportunities to our alumni and advocates for the college. During the 2020-21 fiscal year, SPC alumni contributed \$410,400.

GRANTS

SPC has made a concerted effort to secure grant funding that focuses on the support of short-term trainings and the upskilling/reskilling of today’s workforce into mid-to high wage jobs. During 2020-21, the Grants Department managed \$19.2M over 42 awards, including \$11.5M in new awards. Highlights include:

- SPC was awarded **\$1,924,440 for Student Success**, including funding from the U.S. Department of Education for student support services, as well as grants from the Department of Education and Pinellas County Juvenile Welfare Board to help increase academic success for middle and high school students to prepare them for post-secondary education.
- SPC received three new grants totaling **\$2,341,228 from the Florida Department of Education** to help train individuals for high-demand, high-wage jobs, including those impacted by COVID-19. These grants included support for Rapid Credentialing, Entrepreneurship, and Apprenticeship. T
- **City of St. Petersburg - St. Pete Works (\$2,837,571)** – St. Petersburg College received a Workforce Readiness and Development grant from the City of St. Petersburg to oversee St. Pete Works! This collaborative is focused on providing short-term certificate programs and job placement services to residents in the South St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Area (CRA). As the fiscal and managing administrator of St. Pete Works, SPC collaborates to address critical labor market shortages in Pinellas County by preparing and providing services to “hard-to-hire” residents, to include unemployed young adults between 16 and 24 years of age, single-parent households, unemployed and underemployed residents of the CRA, those impacted by COVID-19, and re-entry offenders in demand occupations and careers with liveable wages to mid-high wage employment.
- **National Science Foundation—Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation Bridge to the Baccalaureate Grant (\$1,000,000)** – SPC has received a second grant to continue the *Tampa Bay Bridge to the Baccalaureate (TB-B2B)* Alliance, a strategic regional partnership of educational institutions and innovative academic supports, focused on increasing the number of underrepresented minority (URM) students transferring to baccalaureate degrees in Science, Engineering, Technology, and Math (STEM). Led by SPC, TB-B2B includes Hillsborough Community College, State College of Florida Manatee-Sarasota, and the University of South Florida System. In this renewal proposal, TB-B2B will continue to develop an educational pipeline that engages URM students from elementary and secondary school through post-secondary enrollment, associate degree attainment, and transfer to a STEM baccalaureate program at USF and other 4-year partners. Program success will be met through the following goals: 1) Increase the number of URM students enrolling in STEM programs of study; 2) Increase URM student math literacy using evidence-based academic supports; 3) Increase URM student retention, persistence, and completion in STEM programs of study; and 4) Increase the number of URM students matriculating into STEM Baccalaureate degree programs. TB-B2B will significantly enhance outcomes for URM students and promote greater diversity in both STEM academic degree programs and the STEM workforce.
- **Pinellas County Board of County Commissioner – Social Action Funding (\$100,000)**
SPC’s African American Male Initiative is a multi-pronged approach that uniquely focuses on engaging and supporting African American male students in a way that will increase retention, success rates, and completion of certificates and/or degrees. The grant provides support for the ongoing development of the Initiative, including

the salary of the coordinator. Funding also provides for areas of greatest need for the target population including advising, tutoring, mentoring, outreach/recruitment, and other related activities.

- **U.S. Department of Defense - Defense STEM Education Consortium (DSEC) Innovation Bloc (\$223,622)** In support of the Defense STEM Education Consortium (DSEC), the Department of Defense has awarded SPC a grant to supports the development and promotion STEM educational and career pathways for minority and underrepresented populations at community colleges. This initiative builds off the College's current efforts to provide student with work-based learning opportunities through internships. Leveraging existing efforts, this initiative will support 60 underrepresented and veteran students in STEM pathways through paid summer internship. Funding will be used to incentivize employers to host paid interns and/or support students through scholarship/stipends related to their internship. Students will also engage in career readiness workshops over the course of the grant.

COLLEGE AWARDS

- **Lady Titans Basketball** team were the Central Conference Champions in the inaugural season of the conference.
- **Men's Basketball** qualified for the state tournament after a second-place conference finish.
- **Lady Titans Tennis** team finished fourth in the nation and second in the state.
- **Lady Titan's Softball** team won four post-season games in a row, won the Suncoast conference tournament playoff, qualified for the FCSAA state tournament, broke a college RBI record, and placed seven players on the All-conference team.
- **Lady Titans Volleyball** team moved from the National Junior College Athletic Association division one to division two.
- **Tampa Bay Times** named SPC "Best of the Best" in their 2020 rankings, which celebrate businesses and organizations loved by the Tampa Bay and North Suncoast communities. SPC earned two goald awards and was voted Best Local College and Best Nursing College.
- SPC was awarded the **Cornerstone Award**, an annual accolade given to an individual or organization that embodies **Year Up's** mission to close the opportunity divide.
- Each year, students in St. Petersburg College's **Business Administration and Management and Organizational Leadership bachelor's programs** participate in **The Business Strategy Game** as part of their MAN 4900 Strategic Capstone Project. This year, three out of four of our Fall 2020 business graduates who went to the international competition placed in the top three!
- **SPC's Marketing and Strategic Communications team** earned a string of wins at the 2020 Annual Conference for the Association of Florida Colleges (AFC) this past fall! They won Gold for institutions with more than 10,000 FTE in Article/Story Pitch Resulting in Publication, Best Photography in a Published Piece, Magazine, Microsite/Landing Page, Television 60 seconds or less, and Website; as well as Bronze for Social Media, Unpaid.
- SPC's new **Student Success Center** is a nominee for the AIA Tampa Bay 2020 Honor and Design Awards in the People's Choice category.
- The **St. Petersburg College Theater Department**, led by Professor Scott Cooper, was recognized by Creative Loafing in this year's Best of the Bay competition. The department's rendition of The Laramie Project, which was performed last October, took second place in the Best Theater Production category.
- **Respiratory Care Program** is among a select group of programs that will be recognized by the Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care (CoARC) to receive the Distinguished RRT Credentialing Success Award. This is the seventh consecutive year the program has received this award, making SPC one of a small percentage of respiratory care educational programs in the nation to consistently meet the criteria.
